

How people live in Banyule




Most people in the City of Banyule own their house or have a **mortgage**.



A mortgage means the bank gives you money to buy a house.

You have to pay the money back to the bank.




Some people **rent** their house.



Rent means that

• someone else owns the house you live in



 you have to pay the person who owns the house.

Other people live in **social housing**.

Social housing means houses for people who **cannot** afford to buy or rent their own house.

There are people from many **diverse groups** in the City of Banyule.


Diverse groups means people from many different backgrounds.

The groups talk to us about






Each advisory committee includes
