Integrated planning

Our new integrated approach to developing Council plans and strategies increased community participation through face-to-face and online seminars, allowing residents to help shape important plans that direct our work now and into the future.

COVID-19 recovery

While the financial and health effects of the pandemic are reducing, Council is mindful that many are still experiencing hardship. We developed a Rates Financial Hardship Assistance Policy to guide our work in caring for those in need, while meeting our responsibilities in managing Council's budget and providing services to our community.

Backing business & local jobs

Council's Economic Development team, Banyule Business, has been a vital support for local enterprises through the pandemic and continues to back business with targeted programs for new and existing businesses. Our award-winning programs are providing people of all abilities with meaningful work and training and helping them build pathways into study and long-term careers.

Addressing the rising cost of waste

We have reconsidered how we manage waste, in the face of rising costs and new regulatory requirements. The successful introduction of our FOGO service was a huge achievement. We've also introduced waste rates to provide better oversight and transparency of the costs of waste management.

Building a better Banyule

Bellfield Community Hub is open and the adjacent community housing development is uderway. We're nearing completion on the redevelopment of Olympic Park and a new Rosanna Library has planning approval. We've maintained a busy program of improvements to sports pavilions, sportsfield lighting, community halls, maternal and child health centres, bushland reserves and other community facilities.

Tough love turns out swimmingly for Nick

Nick Vouk has just won Life Saving Victoria's highest individual honour, the John Wishart Memorial Medal for Lifesaver of the Year, but it was not love at first sight of water.

"I used to hate swimming lessons and would do anything to get out of it," he remembered.

Now aged 22, Nick is a lifeguard and duty manager at Ivanhoe Aquatic Centre and spends most of his spare time volunteering for Surf Life Saving Victoria, where he trains lifeguards and is a state officer looking after clubs around Port Phillip.

"If it hadn't been for this one, things may have been very different for me," he said, gesturing to Liz Dance, sitting beside him.

Liz Dance is the swim teacher who put him through hell all those years ago and whose team recently taught his grandmother to swim. Liz understands the importance of learning to swim and the longterm benefits of learning to love the pool.

"The physiological and psychological health benefits of swimming are unparalleled," she said.

A former high school teacher, Liz is the Aquatic Education Coordinator at Ivanhoe Aquatic, where she leads a team of 50 people who teach swim lessons to more than 1500 people a week. She also manages a small team that trains the lifeguards and swim teachers; this team was named Training and Pool Safety Licensee of the Year at the LSV awards.

"Teaching swimming is the most meaningful teaching I've ever done," she said.

Liz's top tips for water safety: learn to swim and never take your eyes off little ones when near water.

"We are a country surrounded by water; swimming is part of our cultural identity. A competent swimmer can potentially save their our own life or the life of another person."

Pecks Dam repairs

Pecks Dam Reserve is one of a series of small reserves in Montmorency that form a habitat corridor. A mix of conservation and recreation areas, it is managed by Banyule's Bushland Management team with assistance from local volunteers. Its main attraction is the original farm dam, which is 664m2 and about 8m deep when full. Over the years it has been used for swimming, fishing, yabbying and boating and as a subject for artists.

A risk assessment conducted last year found that the dam wall needed to be repaired. Restoration works will reduce peak water levels, improve drainage, control potential stormwater surges and reduce the pressure of retained water, while retaining the look and feel of the existing wall and maintaining the reserve's conservation values.

- A series of workshops for young people, families and professionals on a wide range of topics including cultural diversity, bullying, mental health, supporting your friends and LGBTIQA+ inclusive language.
- A public art installation by a young artist to showcase all-ability talents and start conversations about mental health challenges.
- Activities to promote cultural inclusion, including a Somali-Australian young men's employment forum, women-only swim nights, and culturally accessible mental health first aid.
- A social group for young carers where they could socialise and get support from youth workers.
- Orange Juice', a short film raising awareness and understanding of young women living with Autism (ASD).
- Shout It Out', a live music festival to support and celebrate LGBTIQA+ young people.

Pedals power Kelvin to 95

Kelvin Chamier's first bike was a dashing green Kingdom. When he got it home, his dad sent him back to the shop in Clifton Hill for a larger model that would last longer as he grew. After Kelvin outgrew it, the bike saw many more years service as it was passed down through his siblings.

Kelvin's been through a few bikes since then, graduating to an e-bike three years ago at the age of 92 to ease the daily commute through the hills of Eaglemont to visit his wife in a nursing home. But, when he and his daughter and son-in-law completed the Mawson Trail in South Australia in August, there was no such luxury as electricity; they completed the 900-kilometre journey on mountain bikes, camping along the trail each night.

Now elder statesman of the Banyule Bicycle User Group, Kelvin is a regular on BUG 'Latte Group' rides around Melbourne and occasional country ides. The group is planning a party for his 95th birthday in November. "I love the friendship and the exercise," said Kelvin, pictured above, at front, with other BUG members.

Banyule Bicycle Challenge winners

The 2022 Banyule Bicycle Challenge saw riders of all ages cover 32km in four stages along the Main Yarra and Plenty River trails. Congratulations to our prize winners: Shavaj, Tim, Lester, Salima and Simon. We received some fantastic feedback that we will incorporate into future cycling activities, including more opportunities to explore our recreational trails, improve our facilities and help beginner riders develop skills and confidence.

FOGO is a Go-Go!

It has been fantastic to see the community embrace FOGO, helping divert food and organic waste from landfill to compost. Around 92% of Banyule households are now composting through FOGO and/or home composting.

Plastic and 'compostable' bags are still the number one contaminant in FOGO bins. Plastic bags - even those labelled as biodegradable or compostable - cannot be processed at our organics facility. Instead, try a couple of sheets of newspaper or paper towel to line your kitchen caddy.



The FOGO cycle

How FOGO creates a circular economy for food waste

- Food is grown on farms and sold to through markets.
- Our food scraps, leftovers and spoiled food are collected in the kitchen caddy.
- Garden waste and food collected in the caddy are emptied into the green FOGO bin, which is collected weekly by Council.
- FOGO waste is taken to the composting facility where it undergoes a fast and controlled composting process over 7 10 days. Bin liners and packaging (even those labelled as compostable and biodegradable) can't break down in this time. The FOGO waste is put in a sealed vessel where air is forced in and naturally occurring microbes start the composting process. Oxygen, moisture and temperature are computer controlled to ensure a weed-free and disease-free product.
- After the 7 10 days, the compost is screened and stored into piles outside to mature for 2 3 weeks before being sold as a soil conditioner.
- The soil conditioner is sent to farms, gardens and parks where it is used to nourish the soil that will grow fruits, vegetables and plants, and the cycle starts again!

Why you want to Lid the Link


Hear from locals about why they're throwing their support behind Council's call for a green lid over North East Link. Thank you to everyone who's had their say already.

Artificial wildlife hollows project

Loss of habitat is a pressing issue. That's why we're proud to support this fantastic initiative.

Local friends groups have joined forces with Steve Griffiths from La Trobe University to help restore hollow-bearing trees in the Salt Creek Corridor at Rosanna Parklands.

Nesting boxes in the area had reached the end of their life.

They're now being replaced with ingenious carved hollows that are designed to mimic the properties of natural hollows and last for the life of the tree.

This project will support small hollow nesting birds in the area, including Pardalotes and Musk Lorikeets, as well as Sugar Gliders.


Tyres go round for recycled roads

As part of Council's 2022/23 road resurfacing program we are trialling a recycled asphalt product mixed with crumbed rubber on two roads in Rosanna and Bellfield.

The product, Duramastic Plus, has the same strength and durability of standard asphalt products, but with increased flexibility and reduced cracking due to the addition of crumbed rubber and extra bitumen. The crumbed rubber component is made from used, non-biodegradable Australianmade tyres, reducing the tyre stockpiles that go to landfill and that are a major fire hazard, with the risk of toxic fume emissions. The crumbed rubber used in Duramastic Plus is also locally sourced, reducing transport and fuel costs and emissions.

If the new surface performs satisfactorily, Council will use Duramastic Plus more widely in the road resurfacing program. The trial is a joint project of Banyule City Council and Tyre Stewardship Australia.





Give your trees a trim and keep footpaths clear

With spring in full swing, many gardens now have plants and trees that are overtaking footpaths.

Please make sure that the area around your property is clear. All vegetation must stop at your property or provide at least 2.5 metres of height clearance.

Support for Treaty talks

Banyule Councillors have signalled their support for Victoria's First Peoples' Assembly and the establishment of a Treaty Authority that will negotiate formal Treaties between Traditional Owners of Country and the Victorian Government.

A community forum at Ivanhoe Library and Cultural Hub last month considered the role of the Treaty Authority, seeking to understand the collective hopes, needs and aspirations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the community as a whole.

The First Peoples' Assembly is the democratic voice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in Victoria. The Treaty Authority is a legislated body that operates outside the parliament. Find out more at **firstpeoplesvic.org**

Give your cat the snip and protect native animals

In Banyule, it's free to de-sex your cat with our year-round service.

Simply pick up a voucher from a Council Service Centre by providing proof of Banyule residency.

Thank you for helping us to reduce the stray cat population and protect our native birds and animals.

Please note:

- The de-sexing voucher is only valid at participating vet clinics in Banyule
- You'll need to drop off and collect your pet for de-sexing
- The cat must be de-sexed within 30 days of receiving the voucher
- You will still need to pay for microchipping and animal registration (discounted rate applied after proof of de-sexing provided)
- If you have two or more cats, you'll need an Excess Animal Permit

Beat the heat!

As we head towards summer and temperatures rise, there are some simple ways you can keep energy bills down while ensuring your house is comfortable.



Tips to keep your home cool

- Keep windows, doors and curtains closed from the morning throughout the hottest part of the day, especially on the northand west-facing sides of the house. Open these once the temperature drops in the evening to take advantage of natural breezes.
- If you're using split system air conditioning, keep doors and windows closed and set your temperature to no less than 26 degrees energy bills increase by up to 15% for every degree lower. If you are vulnerable to heat stress, set your temperature as required to stay comfortable.
- Don't let hot air in or cool air out.
 Draught-proof your home by looking for gaps where there is air escaping and seal them. The Victorian Government is offering rebates on sealing upgrades; find out more at victorianenergysaver.vic.gov.au
- Use fans instead of air conditioners if you can – they use a fraction of the electricity and can keep a home sufficiently cool in some circumstances. Fans can also be used in conjunction with air conditioners to circulate cooled air.



Looking to upgrade your old split system before the heat hits?

The Victorian Government is contributing \$1000 towards split system replacement for people that have a combined income under \$90,000 or are concession card holders.

Thank you Banyule! Your support for our new FOGO service means we are on track to meet our target of reducing landfill waste by 6,000 tonnes a year. The first full month of FOGO figures show Banyule's landfill for August was 500 tonnes less than the average for August in the years 2018-2021. That's 50 fewer garbage trucks going to landfill

and 50 trucks of high-grade compost being created for Victorian farms. Also, the contamination rate is pleasingly low. With your continued support, it will only get better. Reptiles are an integral part of local ecosystems and with the warmer weather, you are more likely to see our scaly residents in and around Banyule's bushland reserves.

As ectotherms, a reptile's body temperature matches that of its surroundings. During the winter, they usually stay out of sight, but they may emerge on sunny days to bask in the sun. The arrival of spring sees an increase in activity from insects and other invertebrates that form the staple diet for a range of lizards, including the Eastern Blue-tongued Lizard (pictured).

Our local reptiles have excellent camouflage and blend in with their environment very effectively. This is an adaptation largely to avoid predators.

Banyule's park rangers work actively to protect and enhance the habitat value for local fauna – this includes our reptiles, which are a vital component for a healthy ecosystem as they help keep in check the populations of potential pest species, such as mice.

Reptiles are also an important food source for a range of native birds such as kookaburras, which prey on baby snakes and lizards.



Be snake aware

If you encounter a snake while out and about in Banyule's bushland reserves, stay calm and still, ensure the snake has an escape route, and appreciate them from a distance.
