A new community bus is just around the corner

We are excited to announce a new FREE community bus service in partnership with LINK Community & Transport social enterprise.

The bus will follow a fixed route in Heidelberg West, Bellfield, Ivanhoe, Ivanhoe East, Eaglemont, Heidelberg, Macleod and Rosanna for a 12-month trial, with the potential of becoming a permanent service.

While the bus service will be free for all Banyule residents, it is particularly targeted for the following community members: older adults, residents living with a disability, people with limited access to transport, people from diverse backgrounds and people experiencing financial difficulties.

The bus will operate a few days per week and will transport residents to shopping centres, medical centres, community centres, train stations, libraries and other places of interest.

Accessible transport is a key priority for Council to help vulnerable population groups access services and participate in the wider community.

Councils join forces to blaze a trail across Melbourne's north

Banyule has teamed up with five councils to create a network of linked walking and cycling trails across Melbourne's north.

Northern Trails 2022 is a regional trails strategy that will deliver new links and improve existing trails connecting significant features in the municipalities of Banyule, Merri-bek, Darebin, Hume, Whittlesea and Nillumbik. It includes an updated blueprint and strategic framework for a recreational off-road trail network across northern metropolitan Melbourne.

The 2022 update reflects changes since the strategy was first written in 2016, including completed trail projects, revised Council priorities and altered landscapes as a result of infrastructure projects, population growth and changed urban footprint.

A collaborative project between the six councils, Northern Trails 2022 aims to ensure integrated planning and combined effort in development, management and marketing of the trails network, as well as a united front when advocating for funding and support from other levels of government.

The strategy breaks down recommended trail improvements into region-wide, Council-wide and trail-specific projects. There are several projects in Banyule that will have significant social, health, environmental and economic benefits once completed.

Building set to begin on Rosanna Library

The Rosanna library has closed while we build a new library on the site in Turnham Ave. It will be double the size, with indoor and outdoor spaces over three storeys and will have a bigger children's area, work and study spaces, community meeting rooms, reading areas, Maternal and Child Health services and a toy library.

We've opened a pop-up library at 56 Beetham Parade, Rosanna, while construction is underway.

You'll be amazed at what we've managed to fit in the popup library. There is a selection of loan items on display and you can Click & Collect for items you have put on hold from the wider collection. There's free Wi-Fi, photocopying, printing and scanning facilities and computers for community use, as well as spaces for you to bring your own device or simply sit and read.

With limited space, we won't be able to run programs such as Storytime and Tech Help, however Watsonia and Ivanhoe libraries will be running an expanded range of events until the new Rosanna Library opens in 2024.

Electrify Banyule

Have your appliances seen better days? When it's time to replace them, choose electric!

Electric appliances are a win-win. They're cheaper to run and better for the environment.

There are five steps to consider when planning your transition to an all-electric home:

- 1. Install solar or switch to GreenPower
- 2. Switch to reverse-cycle air conditioning for heating
- 3. Replace old gas hot water with a heat pump system
- 4. Upgrade to induction cooking
- 5. Move to electric transport (bikes and cars)

It's been one year since Banyule resident, Tom, installed solar panels and a battery. Having just moved into the area, the family had set aside money for installing solar as part of the renovations they planned.

For Tom, the solar system was vital for more than reducing energy bills. He spoke about solar panels and the battery as central to the family's future. Tom and his family want to buy an electric vehicle, to contribute to the transition to renewable sources and to increase the value of the property for future sale.

An important part of Council's work is negotiating with state and federal governments and departments for the infrastructure and services our community needs. Here are two of our current advocacy projects.



A safer crossing at Odenwald Rd

Council is ramping up its advocacy for safer pedestrian access across the Odenwald Rd Bridge in Eaglemont.

Council has allocated \$90,000 to trial a dedicated pedestrian path on the bridge and is in final negotiations with Metro Trains Melbourne before the trial begins.

The trial includes:

- reducing the bridge from two traffic lanes to a single lane
- linemarking and signage prompting vehicles to wait before crossing
- installation of speed reduction measures on bridge approaches
- additional footpath and kerb ramp improvements

While these measures will improve pedestrian safety in the interim, Council does not see this as a long-term solution. The bridge is too narrow to accommodate pedestrians and vehicles.

We are advocating to the Victorian Government for construction of a permanent bridge for pedestrians and cyclists to cross the railway line near Odenwald Rd.

Advocating for community work to continue

Programs supporting youth development, parenting support and increased community safety are exceeding expectations since the launch of the *Diverse Communities Project* in West Heidelberg.

The project was introduced to:

- Provide opportunities for social, recreational and leadership programs and events for young people
- Help parents learn how they can best support their families and what local services are available to help
- Support local families with their concerns around mental health and alcohol and drug issues

More than 4000 people have benefitted from the 29 programs and events hosted to date.

This includes 481 professionals from 35 local services who have undertaken cultural competency training to make the services more culturally appropriate and accessible.

Events and programs have focused on early intervention, leadership, family support, intergenerational programs, parenting support, health and wellbeing, community celebration and employment.

Funding for the program is due to end in June and Council is advocating to the Victorian Government for continuated funding.

Building soon to begin on Watsonia Town Square

We've reached an exciting phase in the development of Watsonia Town Square, with the building contractor to be awarded soon and work set to begin in July.

Following extensive community engagement to determine the best design and work plan, we've been busy behind the scenes taking feedback and completing detailed designs, procuring contractors and consulting with Watsonia traders, services and residents.

The Town Square will be a fantastic asset for Watsonia, but we understand the building phase will inevitably involve disruptions. Council will continue to work closely with the local community to minimise disturbances and help you plan around unavoidable disruptions to your routine.

As road upgrades and traffic improvements take place, there will be road closures and detours. We are also working with Watsonia Traders Association to minimise the inconvenience of any changes to car parking.

We'll be keeping you informed through the Banyule Banner, Council's social media, posters and pamphlets at Watsonia Library and around town and via letters to local residents. We'll also be meeting regularly with traders and community groups.

Treaty and Uluru Statement

In December, Banyule Council voted to adopt the Uluru Statement from the Heart and take practical action to advance its core components.

The Uluru Statement from the Heart calls for the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution, a Treaty, and a Makarrata Commission (Truth Telling). Victoria is leading the way in Treaty negotiations with Victorian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people with the establishment of the First Peoples' Assembly in 2019.

What is a Treaty?

Treaty provides a path to negotiate the transfer of power and resources so that First Peoples can control matters that impact their lives. It is the opportunity for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples to retain the freedom and power to make decisions that affect their communities, culture and Country.

What is the First Peoples' Assembly?

Victoria's First Peoples Assembly is a democratic voice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. The Assembly created a framework and ground-rules that will enable Traditional Owners of Country to negotiate Treaties with the Victorian Government. The Assembly is about to enter a re-election period, with nominations for new members in April and voting from 13 May – 3 June.

One visitor travelled all the way from McKinnon on public transport in the hope of seeing the rare Gang Gang Cockatoo at Montmorency Park. He couldn't believe his luck when he hit the jackpot and got this great shot!

This sighting is even more significant given that these once common birds have now been placed on the endangered list under the Federal EPBC Act.

Banyule Council's Environment team values any sighting of local fauna that can help understand overall biodiversity trends in our area. Municipal Laws and animal management

Banyule's Municipal Laws officers provide many services for pets and their owners.



Managing the menagerie

Shifty sheep, roaming rabbits, petulant pooches, cranky cats and hysterical humans. It's all in a day's work for Banyule Municipal Laws officers Renee and Steve.

"What I love about the job is that every day is different, you never know what to expect," said Steve.

Between them they have 36 years working in animal management at councils in Victoria and they've seen everything, but both agree the humble moggie can be the most dangerous of their daily interactions.

As frontline responders to all animal management issues in Banyule, Renee and Steve work shifts around the clock and often find themselves in highly emotional situations.

Registrations

Cats and dogs must be registered with Council and have a microchip and name tag, so they can be easily identified and returned to you should they be lost. Pet registrations can be completed online. There is a scale of fees, including concessions and special rates for desexed animals.

Your responsibilities as a pet owner

Owners must register and microchip their cat or dog.

Dogs should be appropriately trained and socialised and must be kept securely confined in a safe and comfortable environment to prevent them escaping. Walk your dog on a lead in public areas and keep your dog under effective control in leash-free parks.

You must prevent your cat from causing a nuisance to your neighbours. The best way to do this is to desex your cat and provide a safe environment in which it will be happy.

Desexing

Desexing your cat or dog not only avoids unwanted litters and strays, it decreases the chance of many common diseases of pets. Desexing also lessens your pet's desire to roam, decreases aggressive behaviour and can eliminate spraying behaviour in male cats. Pension card holders can pick up a voucher for discounted dog and cat desexing at Council customer service centres.

Lost and found

If your pet is lost, or if you find someone else's lost pet, contact Council to report it by phoning **9490 4222**. Our friendly Municipal Laws officers will collect it and, if the animal is registered and microchipped, may be able to reunite it with its owner. Unregistered animals are transported directly to the pound and a fee must be paid upon their release.

Complaints

The most common complaints received by Council are barking dogs, wandering animals, dog attacks and animal welfare concerns.

Our officers investigate complaints and help owners find the resources they need to look after their pets.

Penalties may apply for unregistered dogs and cats, impounded stray animals and dogs causing a nuisance or attacking people or other dogs.

Curious pet facts

In Banyule there are 13742 registered dogs and 6244 registered cats.

The most popular breeds of dog are the cavoodle, Jack Russell and Staffordshire bull terrier.

The most popular names for dogs are Bella (224 dogs) and Max (217).

The Cat Protection Society

Renowned for their nine lives and ability to land on their feet no matter what befalls them, a cat in distress would be hard pressed to find a softer place to land than the Cat Protection Society of Victoria.

The Greensborough facility is like a five-star hotel for cats, with custom-designed cat 'condos' and the sort of loving attention money cannot buy.

The Society cares for Banyule's stray, impounded and surrendered cats and last year found new homes for more than 1200 cats.

"You can be sure that every cat or kitten adopted from us has been microchipped, desexed, health checked, immunised and loved," said Georgie, who coordinates 65 volunteers who work at the Society.

The centre has a vet clinic that is open to the public and a retail shop for everything cat related.






Celebrating Banyule women



The Scar Trees were photographed by Jim Berg, at Ebenezer, surrounding the Wimmera River on Wotjobaluk Country, north-west of Melbourne. The scars and cavities on the trees were made when First Peoples of the area removed the bark, branches or roots to make canoes, shields, shelters, basin-shaped coolamons, boomerangs and many other implements. This practice still takes place today.



This year's theme is: Nhalinggu Bagung, which in the Woiwurrung language means "come gather".

In December 2022, Council adopted the Uluru Statement from the Heart. This year's theme recognises that reconciliation requires all of us to do our part to build a future for all Australians.

We invite entries from all Australian artists to show us what Reconciliation looks like from your individual perspective and lived experience. for non-Indigenous artists, show us how you would take part in Reconciliation, or what Reconciliation means to you; for First Nations artists, share your culture and story with us and show us the way forward.

Entries will be closely monitored for cultural appropriation – as a non-Indigenous artist, if you are unsure if your artwork/idea is appropriate, please do not hesitate to contact us to check.

The Wurundjeri Woi-Wurrung peoples of the Kulin Nation recognise more than summer, autumn, winter and spring. The Kulin calendar includes seven seasons which are Biderap (Jan-Feb), Luk (March), Waring (April-July), Guling (Aug), Poorneet (Sep-Oct), Buath Guru (Nov) and Gunyang (Dec).

April is the beginning of Waring, also known as the wombat season. Waring goes from April through to July and common traits of this season are misty mornings as well as cold and rainy days. The days get shorter and the nights are long, wombats are seen during the day seeking sunlight and large numbers of moths and fungi can be seen by Darebin creek.
