Inclusive Employment Program continues to provide local jobs

Fourteen new employees are settling into Council jobs in Banyule's Inclusive Employment Program.

Thandie and Raymond are two participants enjoying new challenges and planning for bright futures thanks to the annual jobs program for people who face barriers to finding suitable and meaningful employment.

An experienced marketer in China, Thandie had not worked in paid employment since her husband's job brought the couple to Melbourne eight years ago.

"I thought I would have to be qualified, but the program helped me recognise my skills and gave me confidence," she said.

"It has gone beyond my expectations; it's not just a job, it has made me feel accepted in society."

Now working as a Customer Service Officer, Thandie appreciated the pace of the program, in which participants receive on the job training as well as one-on-one coaching in expanding their personal and professional skills and how to navigate the jobs market. Candidates are offered six months paid employment within Council, after which they have the confidence, experience and references to apply for an ongoing job at Council or elsewhere.

Working with Council's Inclusive Employment Program Officer, Thandie identified her job interests and is studying data analysis, looking to a future in marketing.

"Banyule gave me a chance and it has changed my life. Now I can plan for my future and my experience will not be wasted."

"I am not a quitter," says Raymond, explaining the determination that spurred him through years of a dispiriting search for work in his chosen field.

Born in Nigeria, Raymond had lived in the United States and studied accounting in Malaysia before coming to Australia six years ago. Unable to find a graduate position, he completed Australian qualifications but still could not find work in financial services.

"I found out it's who you know, not what you know; luckily, I got to know Banyule Council," he said.

After seeing a notice in the Banyule Banner, Raymond phoned customer service to ask about the Inclusive Employment Program and things immediately began to fall into place.

"I still remember who I spoke to because she was a former program participant, also from Nigeria," he remembered.

"I went to a community information event and I thought, 'They just want to help me'. It was amazing."

Now two months into the program, Raymond is building on his skills and experience and enjoying work as a Financial Accounts Support Officer.

Urban Forest Strategy takes roots

Council sustains a dynamic and resilient urban forest. Our much-loved trees nurture and enhance the health and wellbeing of our community and natural environments, adding value to local economies, and contributing to Banyule's varied and important neighbourhood character. That's why we are developing an Urban Forest Strategy.

A draft framework for the strategy was developed in collaboration with the community in late 2021. In January, we surveyed the community and your responses have been incorporated into the principles that will guide the strategy.

Your feedback helped us understand what you consider to be the critical issues for our urban forest. You told us about the importance of the tree canopy and urban greening, and the need to increase the diversity of tree species. You also stressed the importance of habitat connection and protection, and told us our urban forest must be resilient and adaptable to climate change.

The next phase of the project is developing the strategies, actions and targets for the next 10 years.

Get on board the Hurstbridge Rail Corridor Feasibility Study

Have you ever wondered how land alongside the Hurstbridge railway line could be better used?

We're keen to see this underutilised open space transformed for the community. We'd like to improve landscaping and seating, plus walking and cycling paths along this 18km rail corridor from Darebin station to Montmorency station.

Our draft Hurstbridge Feasibility Study explores safe, direct and active transport options to connect

residents and users to places along the rail line and in adjacent activity centres. It also outlines the potential of improved urban design and landscaping to create more attractive and welcoming spaces.

We'd love to hear your ideas and feedback to help us develop final recommendations for the study. These recommendations will inform our infrastructure program and our advocacy efforts to state and federal government agencies that own sections of the land.

Reconciliation Banyule: the activists among us

They come from diverse backgrounds and carry with them even greater diversity in lived experiences. Experiences that bring them together in solidarity with the local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community to achieve true reconciliation.

Under the banner of Reconciliation Banyule, this group of Banyule community members have for years been working with Council, schools, libraries, community groups and First Nations Peoples to help eliminate the legacy of a white-washed history.

President of Reconciliation Banyule, Ms Sue Harris, says: "[Reconciliation] is something we talk about a lot as if it were done... But actually it's something that we're dreaming of, looking forward to, and trying to take steps towards so that we might live in a better way in this country with our brothers and sisters.

"All our brothers and sisters."

While many organisations seeking to support First Nations justice in this country aim their sights at state and federal government, Reconciliation Banyule recognises - and takes advantage of - the very real power of change that can be achieved at a local government level.

In commenting on that, Ms Harris says: "[At this level] the hope is that we will know the [Aboriginal] people and have a relationship with them."

It is that relationship with the local First Nations community that has been instrumental in Reconciliation Banyule having a strong voice in the development of Banyule Council's Reconciliation Action Plan and the commitment from Council to provide ongoing support to the establishment of the Barrbunin Beek Indigenous Gathering Place.

Yet there is always more work to be done in righting the wrongs of over 250 years of injustices. Work that can only be achieved with the concerted effort of dedicated Banyule community members! So here's a challenge: Will you be among them?

Building a better Banyule

Olympic Park Masterplan

Over the past few years we've been delivering a multimillion dollar project at Olympic Park in Heidelberg West. The project is transforming the precinct, upgrading sporting, recreational and leisure facilities for local residents, clubs and the wider community.

Stages 1 and 2 have already been delivered:

- A state-of-the art soccer ground (NPL standard) and upgraded utilities infrastructure
- A new synthetic mini-roos soccer pitch
- Expanded and redeveloped car park with a capacity of 147
- New playground and community spaces
- Landscaping and shared paths
- 1956 Memorial Olympic Garden

Stage 3 is underway and will see a new car park with an **additional 64 spaces** north of the entrance to Olympic Park Reserve.

Stage 4 starts in the coming months and includes:

- Upgrade of two sports grounds including fencing and lighting
- Construction of a new pavilion and cricket nets
- Refurbishment of Barrbunin Beek

This project is supported by an \$8 million Victorian Government funding contribution, including \$4.5 million for stages 3 and 4.

We have opened a new round of grants to help businesses survive and thrive through the challenges of COVID-19.

COVID-19 Banyule Business Grants have supported over 200 businesses to improve their financial resilience. As a result of the grants, more than 20 new jobs have been created and over \$130,000 has been spent in our community with our local traders.

Projects that have been funded through these grants have helped business owners seek professional advice, move their business online or increase their digital presence, and introduce new products or services. We have supported home-based business, sole traders and start-ups, as well as those operating from commercial sites across Banyule.

With a funding pool of \$210,000, we encourage all business owners to consider applying.

Solar Savers has done the hard work by selecting reliable solar installers that can provide high-end solar systems at an affordable rate, no matter the size of your premises. Enjoy peace of mind knowing your installers have been independently evaluated for safety, product quality and value for money.

The maximum Solar Victoria rebate for small businesses is \$3,500, up to 50% of the cost



of installation. Only 1600 rebates remain until it reduces to \$1,750. Payback periods can be as quick as three years. Rental premises are eligible with agreement of the landlord.

Get savvy and save on energy

Banyule residents can save on energy costs and create a more comfortable home through the Victorian Government's Energy Savvy Upgrades program, which offers subsidised energy assessments and upgrades to housing and major fixed appliances.

The program is open to residents on a low income or who are unemployed, and people with a long-term medical condition or disability, as well as those caring for someone in similar circumstances.

Upgrades subsidised include insulation, draught proofing, heating and cooling, hot water services, window shading and lighting. The program is open to home owners, renters and landlords.

Climate action to net zero

We have set a target for Council to be zero net emissions by 2028. Here are a few of the initiatives that are putting us on the path.

100% renewable electricity

As of 1 July 2021, all of Council's electricity is sourced from 100% renewable wind energy, thanks to a partnership agreement with 46 other Victorian Councils. This will significantly reduce the Council's overall emissions and represents a milestone in our work towards carbon neutrality.

Driving change with EVs

We're switching our fleet to electric vehicles (EVs). Last year, we reduced our light fleet emissions from 124 to 95 tCO2-e, and we've got more EVs coming down the track.



More solar power

72 Council-owned buildings now have solar power, generating 1.53 MW. Our leased building solar program has now started, helping community users such as preschools or sporting clubs to reduce their bills.

New investment for pools

One of the biggest challenges in achieving carbon neutrality is in our aquatic centres, where there is a large demand for heating and cooling. Here, we are investing in energy-efficient products in the short term to ensure our energy use is as smart as possible, before we trial gas replacement technologies such as heat pumps.

Energy efficient Council buildings

We've been doing energy efficiency audits at Council sites that use the most gas and electricity. The findings will inform energy efficiency and electrification works that will be rolled out to reduce energy use and our bills.

Making changes at home

Our Better Score program provided co-funding to residents to implement energy efficiency actions. We've seen new solar systems, double glazing and insulation upgrades on homes in Banyule. The program will relaunch in the next financial year.

Pecks Dam, Montmorency

Montmorency is home to several bushland reserves that are important links in the Diamond Creek and Plenty River wildlife corridors and contain a remarkable diversity of locally indigenous vegetation.

While the reserves through Montmorency are quite small individually, their combined habitat value is crucial for local wildlife, especially in the urban environment. The range of different habitats, from wetlands to grasslands, provide homes for a variety of wildlife.

Banyule Council's Bushland Management Unit is responsible for protecting and enhancing biodiversity in Montmorency's reserves. This involves weed management, planting and direct-seeding locally indigenous vegetation, conducting ecological burns to stimulate regeneration of local plants, and monitoring flora to detect changes in biodiversity.
