Council Budget

Banyule remains in a secure and sustainable financial position following the adoption of the 2024/25 Budget.

This is the result of a lot of hard work and difficult decisions by Councillors, with the support of staff at all levels of Council.

Thank you to the community members who helped us prepare the Budget by attending planning sessions, telling us your priorities and giving feedback. We've balanced community expectations with maintaining a sustainable outlook within the constraints of limited revenue sources and a rate cap.

We will continue to provide a high standard of facilities and services while ensuring great value for every dollar of rates collected.

Housing targets

We know Banyule is a desirable place to live with good transport and infrastructure and we will continue to see an increase in housing.

The Victorian Government's new draft housing targets propose an 87% increase in the number of dwellings in Banyule by 2051. The government is consulting with councils and will release the final targets later this year.

We are working with the government to ensure Banyule gets the housing we need, in the places we need it, while preserving our liveability, neighbourhood character and tree canopy, in line with Council's Draft Housing Strategy and Draft Neighbourhood Character Strategy.

Building a great future

We're delighted to feature some of the infrastructure and facilities we've recently completed or have well underway. There are seven new playgrounds to explore, progress on major projects like Watsonia Town Square and upgrades to facilities like Rosanna Fire Station Neighbourhood House.

Walking and bike riding





Stand for Council

Council elections happen every four years in Victoria. The next election is in October. We talk with Banyule Chief Executive Officer, Allison Beckwith, to see what it means for Banyule.

What is your role as CEO of Banyule Council?

I support the Mayor and Councillors in their roles and I'm responsible for the overall management of day-to-day operations of Banyule Council. I make sure the decisions of Council are implemented in a timely manner.

What is the role of a Banyule councillor?

Councillors make important decisions on behalf of the community. They decide what council spends its money on and how to manage development in Banyule. While councillors support the people in the ward they are elected to, they are required to represent the interests of the whole Banyule community when making decisions.

So, they can decide whatever they want!?

Not quite! All councils work within state and federal requirements and strict governance regulations. Banyule has policies and plans that set our direction for the future. Each council builds on the work of previous councillors.

What do councillors actually do?

Each councillor will do things a little differently, however they must operate in line with the Councillor Code of Conduct and legislation that sets strict parameters on things that they can and cannot do. There are council meetings, briefings and reports to read. They manage enquiries from residents and businesses about council services and programs. They might make a speech at an event one day then sit on a council committee the next. Many balance their council role with work and family responsibilities, so they are very busy people.

It sounds like hard work! Why would you do it?

Councillors want to contribute to making Banyule a better place for our community and future generations.

If you have a passion for Banyule and making a positive contribution to your community, the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) is running a series of information sessions to provide information and inspiration.

Banyule is teaming with its Northern Councils Alliance partners for the session in Melbourne's north. Hear from a panel of experts including Banyule CEO Allison Beckwith.



What makes a good councillor?

A good councillor considers the whole community in the decisions they make. They are available and accessible, have strong interpersonal skills and work well in teams. They are leaders who can challenge the status quo. They keep up with changing policies, legislation and community expectations. They act within the laws and are respectful to other councillors, the community and council staff.

Are they paid?

Councillor allowances are set by the Victorian Independent Remuneration Tribunal. At Banyule, the current annual allowances are \$130,390 for the Mayor, \$65,195 for the Deputy Mayor and \$39,390 for other councillors.

Who can stand as a candidate for Banyule Council?

Most adult residents who are Australian citizens are eligible to stand for council. Check the elections page on our website for more information (details below).

I've heard about a 'caretaker' period; what is that?

It is the time between when candidate nominations open and the day of the election. This election, it begins at 12pm on 17 September and ends at 6pm on 26 October. There are strict rules on what council staff and councillors can and cannot do during the caretaker period. This is to ensure there is no interference in the election and to safeguard the authority of newly elected councillors. We're busy putting everything in place to keep things running smoothly and all council services will operate as normal during caretaker.

Have you seen our newest playgrounds?

There's plenty of choice if you're looking for a fresh playground to visit with the family. We've created seven new playgrounds in our 2023/24 Playground Replacement Program.

Each year we renew a number of Banyule's 150 playgrounds as they reach the end of their functional life, replacing them with new designs for the community. The old playgrounds don't go to waste. They are upcycled by the Rotary Club of Nunawading, who refurbish and rebuild them in countries such as Sri Lanka and Fiji.

Over the past 12 months we've renewed:

- Bolton Street Playground, Eltham
- Malcolm Blair Reserve Playground, Greensborough
- Larool Avenue Reserve Playground, St Helena
- Glendale Reserve Playground, Eltham North
- · Yulong Reserve Playground, Bundoora
- Weidlich Road Reserve Playground, Eltham North
- Montmorency Park Playground, Montmorency

Check out the new basketball court in Weidlich Road Reserve, fitness equipment at Montmorency Park Playground and wall climbing areas in Malcolm Blair Reserve.

We've also built nature play areas at these playgrounds:

- Buna Reserve, Heidelberg West
- Haward Walkway, Rosanna
- The Righi Reserve, Eaglemont
- Nellie Ibbott Reserve, Ivanhoe

Banyule's Urban Forestry Team will add the finishing touches over the coming months, planting more than 40 trees around these playgrounds to provide natural shade.

Banyule residents and visitors have a strong connection to natural and green spaces, including more than 150,000 public trees, plus many more on private land.

Protection for trees on private property

Banyule's planning rules protect trees on private property. You may need to apply for a permit to remove or prune a tree on your property. It will be assessed by our planning arborists, Michael and Karl.

Council receives about 600 applications for tree removal each year. Around 40% are either refused, withdrawn by the applicant after assessment by our arborists, or converted to pruning applications. Where a private tree is approved for removal, two replacement trees must be planted.

"We try to take out the emotional factors. Each application is assessed on its merits and we are always guided by Banyule's planning scheme," said Michael.

Illegal tree removals

Part of their job is to investigate illegal tree removals. A worrying trend is an increase in poisoning of significant trees.

Each year Council investigates around 100 cases of illegal removal, poisoning or damage of trees. Successful prosecutions in the Magistrates' Court have resulted in substantial penalties to property owners and contractors who carry out the work – up to \$65,000 in one recent case.

Growing our urban forest

Council's Urban Forest team is planting 1,600 trees in streets and parks over the cooler months. At the same time, the team will assess trees planted in the previous two years to ensure they are healthy and growing well. We'll be planting in Banyule streets and parks, with an emphasis on the northern suburbs that have less tree cover.

You can help look after new trees by removing any rubbish around the base and watering it once a month in winter or each week during summer.

Some of the trees being planted are kurrajongs propagated in Council's nursery in Bellfield. Urban Forester Ryan, right, pictured at the nursery with Nursery Officer Alistair, is proud to be making Banyule a better place.

"My legacy will be more canopy cover in Banyule," he said.

Banyule Council secures \$14 million for community sport

Chelsworth Park will get two new public pavilions in an agreement between Banyule Council and Ivanhoe Grammar School.

The school will pay for the pavilions under the terms of a 40-year lease to use the park sporting facilities.

The pavilions will be used by nine other community clubs that share use of Chelsworth Park and the park will remain open to the public for casual sports and recreation.

"This is a great deal for Council, for the sporting clubs, for residents, and for the school," said Banyule Mayor Cr Tom Melican.

Community support

Council included new clauses in the lease after extensive community consultation. These included traffic and parking management plans, limiting the hours of use, protection for heritage buildings and a requirement that no new fences could be erected.

"The vast majority of people who we spoke to supported this lease," Cr Melican said.

The school has priority use of the sports grounds and pavilions for approximately 7% of usable (daylight) hours, primarily weekdays after school until 5.30pm and Saturday mornings. Other clubs that use the park are community cricket and athletics clubs and Auskick.

Making the most of our public assets

Or Melican said Council would continue to work with Ivanhoe Grammar to deliver the pavilions and other terms of the agreement. A Council officer would be appointed to a steering group to manage the project.

"This new lease is about improving the facilities, respecting the past and building for the future. It was a very clear choice," he said.

Council aims for public assets to be shared amongst community groups so they are used more of the time. Banyule has joint user agreements with other schools and is investigating further opportunities for collaboration to secure priority infrastructure.





Never bin your batteries

We've had two battery fires in Banyule in the last 5 months, caused by batteries in kerbside bins.

Batteries are a serious fire risk in bins, collection vehicles and processing facilities as well as being bad for the environment if they end up in landfill. Rechargeable and lithium-ion batteries can and do overheat and explode in kerbside bins.

Vapes, laptops, mobiles, cameras, power tools and electronic toys often have batteries, and they are not welcome in kerbside bins. For more tips on how to dispose of e-waste (anything that requires a charge, plug in or batteries), visit banyule.vic.gov.au/ewaste

A new agriculture centre at Bundoora Secondary College will benefit the school and the Banyule community.

The college has joined with Banyule Council, the Victorian Government and community group Local Food Connect to establish an Urban Agricultural Education Centre.

While the school already has a thriving farm and environment program, the centre will enable it to offer more programs in urban food production, agriculture, horticulture and conservation. This will include Vocational Education and Training qualifications for senior students studying at all schools in northern Melbourne through the Northern Melbourne VET Cluster.

Local Food Connect will contribute \$250,000 to establish the urban agriculture centre. The group's successful government grant of \$200,000 was originally earmarked for a farm in Eltham, however the funding was redirected after talks between Local Food Connect and Council identified Bundoora Secondary College as the ideal place for an educational and community food hub.

Community involvement

The agriculture centre and market garden will be available for community use outside school hours. Likely activities include food gardening activities and produce markets. It aligns with Council's vision outlined in the Urban Food Strategy, which emphasises local food sustainability and food security.



Bundoora Secondary College is in the midst of upgrades that include a new science building and adjoining piazza for school and community events.

The new buildings, part of the Victorian Government schools upgrade and modernisation program, are due to be completed by the end of the year.

Building a Better Banyule

We're building a better Banyule by creating new and refreshed spaces for our community – including community buildings, parks, sportsgrounds, carparks and playgrounds.

We are investing more than \$65 million into our capital works program and \$59.1 million to renew and upgrade our existing assets. Council is also seeking other sources of funding, such as Government grants, to make big projects possible. Here's the latest on some of Banyule's major projects. East Ivanhoe Preschool is growing

East Ivanhoe Preschool is expanding from one to two kindergarten rooms, which means more 3- and 4-year old kinder places for local families.

The \$3.6 million construction project is funded by the Victorian Government to increase the number of preschool places. The new kinder will be operational next year.

While the new building takes shape, the kinder has temporarily relocated to 26 Leicester Street, Heidelberg Heights. For more about attending a kinder in Banyule, visit banyule.vic.gov.au/kindergartens

Olympic Park redevelopment opens

An \$18.5 million transformation of the Olympic Park precinct in Heidelberg West, including refurbishing Barrbunin Beek, refurbished sports grounds, cricket pitch, landscaping, and a new slip road opened in May. The Olympic Park and East Ivanhoe Golf projects received funding support from the Victorian Government.



Next stage for Watsonia Town Square

We can't wait to see the landscaping work begin in Watsonia Town Square later this year now that the substantial structural work on roads, drainage and parking is finished.

There will be new shared user paths, shade structures, and more plants. The Morwell Avenue car park will be finished in the next quarter, including new lighting ready to switch on to make it safer for you to get around at night.

Later we will shift the focus to the library side of Watsonia Road to create a new playground and an accessible toilet block. This huge project is on track to be finished around mid-2025. We know that Watsonia is feeling the impact of this build and the North East Link works, and we appreciate your patience as we build the town square. It's a significant investment in Watsonia that will result in an even better place for people to shop and enjoy.

Rosanna Library build gets going

Works will start soon on the new Rosanna Library, which will be double the size of the existing 50-year-old library and will have a much larger space for children, co-working and study spaces, community meeting rooms, reading areas, quiet spaces and a terrace on level 2.

Council approved a fixed-cost build of the library at \$7.9 million, with fit-out costs to be confirmed as the project progresses.

The cost is offset by a \$1.5 million Victorian Government grant and \$2.75 million from the sale of land to Woolworths.

Woolworths is also covering the cost of town planning, building permits, authority approvals, demolition of the old library and construction of the shared underground carpark.

Generations unite at Bellfield Hub

Many people may have watched the popular ABC show *Old People's Home For 4 year olds* and now Banyule is excited to host its very own intergenerational program at Bellfield Community Hub.

Once a week, children from Audrey Brooks Preschool have been visiting a group of older adults who attend a social support program at the Hub. They've enjoyed art and craft, singing, gentle movement, gardening and reading together. Staff involved in the program said it had been heartwarming watching relationships develop between young and old.

Research shows both generations benefit from spending time together. The children develop language and vocabulary skills along with improved sharing behaviour and empathy towards others, while the seniors experience increased mobility, a reduction in feelings of isolation and loneliness and a renewed sense of meaning and purpose.

After the six-week pilot has been evaluated, it is expected the program will be ongoing at Bellfield Community Hub. It contributes to some of Council's commitments in our Ageing Well in Banyule Framework 2024–2030 and Child and Youth Framework 2021–2030.



New ways to a comfier home with Solar Savers

The popular Solar Savers program now includes energy-efficient split systems and heat pump hot water systems.

Heating accounts for 43% of energy costs in the average Victorian home. Replacing an older heating system with an energy efficient split system will save money and make your home safer and more comfortable.

Heat pump hot water systems use up to 75% less electricity than a conventional electric system and are a smart change from gas. Instead of using an element, heat pump systems transfer heat from the air to the water. If you already have solar, a heat pump consumes excess power during peak sun. It's like having a virtual battery in your home.

Joint effort secures road safety funding

Persistence has paid off for Banyule's advocacy work, with the Victorian Budget including \$2.78 million for a pedestrian crossing on Diamond Creek Road in Greensborough.

Working with community members and local MPs, Council advocated strongly for a crossing after two car accidents involving local students last year.

Or Elizabeth Nealy said the crossing would improve safety on the busy road and commended community members who collected a petition that was presented to Parliament.

"This shows that when we all work together we can achieve great outcomes for our community," she said.

With Cr Nealy and MPs Colin Brooks and Vicki Ward at the announcement were two people with a special interest in the issue - Eliza, who was injured when hit by a car while crossing the road after school, and her mum Louise. Also there for the good news were Montmorency Secondary College principal Frances Ibbott and Greensborough Joanne, who started the petition.

The location of the crossing is to be determined. Council will continue to advocate on what it believes to be the best site.



Stats add up for inclusive employment program

Andrew Close is one of 12 employees in Banyule's 2024 Inclusive Employment Program.

A data and information management officer in Council's Digital Transformation team, Andrew holds a Bachelor of Science majoring in maths and statistics and a Master of Data Science. He has already produced a report on the importance of clean data for Council's Digital Futures project.

Surgery to remove a brain tumour when he was eight left Andrew with very little sight, though he is adamant the crippling headaches and nausea that disappeared with the tumour were worse than the vision impairment that resulted from the surgery.

Andrew uses JAWS (Job Access With Speech) screen reader technology for computer applications and is accompanied by his guide dog Fred.

Outside of work, Andrew is a keen athlete, recording a personal best over 100m in the Australian Athletics Championships in Adelaide in April. His other events include 200m, 400m, 600m, shot put, long jump, javelin and discus.

Andrew hopes to find further employment at the end of the six-month Inclusive Employment Program

"This is good for my resume and I want to say thanks to Banyule for the opportunity to show my skills," he said.

A model for fighting unemployment

Now in its sixth year, the Inclusive Employment Program has helped 81 Banyule residents who were facing barriers to employment.

Employees are given six months paid work at Council. They are supported by individual and group coaching and development opportunities that build work skills and professional networks.

Banyule's Inclusive Employment Program was the first of its kind and has been used as a model by other councils to help combat local unemployment.





Body image, cultural inclusion and gender equality. Banyule's young people are not afraid of tackling the big issues affecting them and their peers.

These were just three of the priority concerns from Banyule Youth Summit 2023, when 100 young people met to discuss community issues that matter to them. They came up with more than 40 recommendations that Banyule Youth Services and a panel of Youth Summit Representatives have been working to implement.

While Youth Summit happens every two years, in the in-between year Youth Services holds a community 'report card' forum where they report on progress toward the recommendations of the summit.

In preparation for the report card session at the end of July, Youth Summit Representatives met with councillors, CEO Allison Beckwith and the Youth Services team to share what they have been working on. Initiatives included a social media campaign challenging gender stereotypes and sharing the stories of culturally diverse young people.

Many spoke of the leadership skills they have developed while serving as Youth Summit Representatives.



Planting the Seed for eco success

Another pocket of Rosanna Parklands has been planted back to health thanks to Banyule Primary School students.

The children helped revegetate a degraded patch in the Parklands, collecting seeds and taking cuttings from indigenous plants, propagating and caring for seedlings and preparing the area for planting.

A Wurundjeri representative provided a link with local cultural history and knowledge of native plants and wildlife. The children enjoyed traditional storytelling and exploring bush tucker and medicine plants.

The Planting the Seed project was made possible by a Banyule Environment Grant to Eco Warriors Australia. Ecologists from Ecology & Restoration Australia advised on revegetation activities. The project aligns with Council's strategy to protect and enhance our natural environment.

The children are monitoring the success of the revegetation project with simple data collection tools.

"Many children today have little experience of our natural environments," said ecologist Fiona, pictured with students.

"We hope this experience will enhance their understanding of native plants and animals and encourage them to value our natural environments and Aboriginal cultural heritage."

Building news

Rosanna Neighbourhood House

We've completed improvements to make Rosanna Fire Station Neighbourhood House more accessible, safer and more efficient. In addition to new accessible toilets, some asbestos sheeting in was removed and new floor coverings were installed in the kitchen and hallways. The electricity system was upgraded to meet building regulations and some lighting was converted to more efficient LED fittings.



Macleod toilets

The new public toilets in Macleod will soon be open.
The toilet block is centrally located on the village green,



I'm proud to see Banyule's Infrastructure team leading the way on use of tools that are better for the environment, our team members and the community.

I asked the team to give me a demonstration and was blown away by the improvements on so many levels.

Not only are the new battery-operated tools lighter and easier to use, they are

much quieter and safer, with no pull cords that contributed to injuries and no diesel fumes.

It means the team doesn't have to handle dirty flammable fuels and the band saw doesn't even emit sparks, which makes it safer, especially during the fire danger period. On top of all this, the tools are cheaper to run and require less maintenance.

Weed in focus

English ivy (Hedra Helix)

English ivy is a vigorous, hardy creeper that grows quickly and can smother indigenous vegetation. It produces hundreds of seeds that native birds feed on and then distribute widely.

Control of this invasive species is simple if you get onto it quickly. Small plants are easily removed by hand and it's important to hand-weed regularly to stay on top of it. Large plants can be controlled by cutting the stems in 20-30cm lengths close to the base of the plant. The top of the plant will die off while you control regrowth at the base. For larger plants you may need professional help.

Banyule's Bushland Management team and Environmental Friends groups work tirelessly to remove English ivy from bushland sites and would love your help in controlling it on your property.



Indigenous plant in focus

Purple coral-pea (Hardenbergia violacea)

The purple coral-pea is a good replacement for non-native climbers. It's abundant purple flowers attract local butterflies and native bees. It is easy to grow and can be trained to climb on trellises and arches. Purple coral-peas and other indigenous plants can be purchased from one of Banyule's indigenous nurseries.

Wurundjeri seasons

The months of April to July are known as Waring to people of the Kulin Nations, of which the Wurundjeri Woi wurrung are part. *Waring* is the Woi-wurrung word for wombat, which emerge from their borrows on cool days to bask in the sun.

You will notice silver wattle trees flowering and rain moths emerging from the ground after years living underground as grubs, eating the tree roots. The empty pupal cases, from which the moths have emerged, can be found under trees such as red gums.

Male lyrebirds build their display mounds, on which to parade, showing off their spectacular tail feathers and singing songs to attract a mate.

Silver Wattle trees are of significant use to the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung. The tree produces long, straight, strong stems that are ideal for making spears.



The hard wood has been used for boomerangs, spear throwers, clubs, shields, axe handles, chisels, coolamons, digging sticks and clap sticks. The bark is used for implements and dishes.
